## Why All the Fuss about Computer Voting Machines?

Most of us are aware of the nightmare caused by “hanging chads” on the punch-card ballots in Florida in the 2000 election. Following that fiasco, the federal government passed the “HAVA” law – which stands for “Help America Vote Act.” It appeared that this law would solve those problems caused by “hanging chads” and other difficulties that were not being addressed by officials in various states throughout the country. The law requires many things such as full accessibility for the handicapped, voting methods that are clear and easy to use, and training for precinct workers so that they can help with any difficulties experienced by a voter.

One of the things the law did *not* do was to ban punch-card ballots! That appears to be a belief held by many citizens, especially here in Chester County where the punch card ballot was used by many, many municipalities. However, because the punch-card ballot could not easily be adapted for use by people with disabilities, it was destined to be discarded in favor of an easier, more flexible system.

Most of us are, by this time, at least comfortable with typing on a computer and we expect that what we typed will or can be “saved” with accuracy; so it was not unusual that many thought that using a computer system for voting would be a fast, easy and accurate way to capture votes. Many companies began making these so-called “touch screen” voting machines, which are nearly identical to the computers we use to order food at our local Wawa or Sheetz stores.

By the Presidential election of 2004, many municipalities across the country had instituted touch-screen voting machines. But they turned out *not* to be the panacea that they were promised to be by their inventors and manufacturers. In fact, many more municipalities reported serious problems with these machines than had reported problems in the 2000 election!

From simple issues such as machines that just would not work to more serious and complicated issues such as machines appearing to work but then not reporting any votes or reporting more votes than there were registered voters, the touch-screen machines have become the subject of much debate and now even the subject of lawsuits.

### What our branch believes in--

I want to review with you the goals and priorities of our branch as developed by the Board in September. We have agreed on the following areas of focus for this year:

- Continue our excellent series of monthly programs, of social and cultural merit
- Involve new and more members--and have fun while we do it
- Continue reaching out and working with other organizations that support our goals, such as the Chester County Women's Commission, the YWCA of Chester County, and the League of Women Voters of Chester County
